As the APC prepares for the 2026 NDC, the race for the flagbearer position will be pivotal — a make or break for the party's survival.

The race to become the flagbearer of Sierra Leone's All People's Congress (APC) is more than a mere political contest; it is a high-stakes, multi-faceted gauntlet that tests an aspirant's political acumen, influence, and financial muscle. As one of the two major political parties in the country, the APC's choice for its leader and presidential candidate is a decision that ripples across the nation, shaping the political landscape and the future of Sierra Leone. The process is a complex tapestry woven from a party's internal constitution, national electoral laws, and the intricate dynamics of power, patronage, and public perception.

The path to the flagbearer position is first and foremost governed by a dual legal and constitutional framework.

Aspiring candidates must meet both the requirements set forth by the national constitution of Sierra Leone and the internal constitution of the APC. The national constitution sets the fundamental criteria for any person to run for the presidency, such as age, citizenship, and qualification to be a Member of Parliament. These are nonnegotiable legal hurdles that every candidate must clear.

The APC's own constitution is the most critical document for an aspirant. It outlines the specific criteria for leadership, the selection process, and the rights and responsibilities of members. A candidate must be a registered, financially up-to-date member of the party. The party's constitution details the internal electoral process, which typically culminates in

a National Delegates' Conference (NDC). This conference, composed of delegates from across the country's districts and constituencies, holds the ultimate power to elect the flagbearer. The process is not always a simple open vote and can be influenced by endorsements, consensus-building, and backroom negotiations.

Beyond the formal requirements, a successful flagbearer aspirant must possess a potent combination of political, social, and financial capital. These three forms of capital are not independent; they are deeply intertwined and mutually reinforcing. A deficiency in one area can undermine the others, making a balanced and robust approach essential for a serious contender.

- Political capital is the accumulated goodwill, influence, and trust that an aspirant has built within the party structure and the broader political establishment. It is the measure of their political clout. This capital is not earned overnight; it is the result of a long and dedicated political career.
- Social capital is the public trust and credibility an aspirant has earned outside the party, among the general populace. It reflects their ability to connect with everyday citizens and build a broad base of support. In a country like Sierra Leone, with its diverse communities and strong regional ties, this is especially vital.
- Financial capital is the monetary resource required to run a modern political campaign. In a country like Sierra Leone, where a successful campaign requires extensive travel and a well-oiled organizational machine, this is a nonnegotiable factor.

Aspirants are not lone actors. Their success hinges on their ability to build and leverage a robust political network. The APC, like any major political party in the world, has its internal factions and power struggles. An aspirant must be capable of navigating these complex relationships, building bridges, and at times, forming strategic alliances to outmaneuver rivals.

While the internal party vote is what counts, a candidate's public image and platform are crucial for both winning the nomination and the general election.

Grassroots Connection: The APC is a party with deep roots in the northern parts of the country and among certain ethnic groups. Since 2018, Dr. Richard Konteh has made a concerted effort to connect with ordinary Sierra Leoneans and grassroots APC supporters across the country and in the diaspora. Since April this year, he and his team has embarked on a "Hope and Unity Tour" across the nation covering every district from north to south, east to west, and the diaspora to places like Glasgow in Scotland, Virginia, Philadelphia, Delaware, and New York in the USA, Accra Ghana, Monrovia Liberia, Banjul, The Gambia, and Guinea-Bissau. He has volunteered his resources for every bi-election and the 2023 general elections to ensure the APC party's votes are counted and reported fairly. He has been featured on national radio and TV news outlets, defending and promoting the party's ideals. These are the genuine efforts that will make the APC party victorious in the 2028 election.



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

UNDERSTANDING STROKE: A RACE AGAINST TIME



Stroke, often called a "brain attack," is a critical medical emergency that affects the brain's blood supply. It's a leading cause of death and disability worldwide, but understanding its causes, symptoms, and treatments can make all the difference. While it may seem daunting, up to 80% of strokes are potentially preventable, according to the American Stroke Association (ASA).

What Is a Stroke?

Simply put, a stroke occurs when a vessel supplying blood to the brain is either blocked or ruptured. When brain cells are deprived of oxygen-rich blood, they begin to die within minutes. This can lead to a range of severe and lasting effects, from physical impairments to cognitive challenges.

Types of Strokes

There are three main types of strokes, each with a different cause and treatment:

• Ischemic Stroke: This is the most common type, accounting for about 87% of all cases. It happens when a blood clot obstructs a vessel in the brain, preventing blood flow. The primary culprit is often

atherosclerosis, where fatty deposits called plaque build up on artery walls. Urgent treatment for an ischemic stroke often involves clotbusting medications like Alteplase or mechanical clot removal procedures.

• Hemorrhagic Stroke:

Making up about 13% of strokes, this type occurs when a weakened blood vessel ruptures and bleeds into the brain. The accumulated blood puts pressure on the surrounding brain tissue, causing damage. The most frequent cause of hemorrhagic strokes is uncontrolled high blood pressure.

• Transient Ischemic Attack (TIA): Often called a "ministroke," a TIA is a temporary event caused by a brief blockage of blood flow to the brain. While the symptoms are short-lived, a TIA is a powerful warning sign that a person is at higher risk for a full-blown

Know the Symptoms: F.A.S.T.

stroke.

Recognizing the signs of a stroke and acting quickly is crucial. The acronym F.A.S.T. is an easy way to remember the key symptoms:

- Face Drooping: Is one side of the face numb? Ask the person to smile—is their smile uneven?
- Arm Weakness: Is one arm weak or numb? Ask them to raise both arms—does one drift downward?
- Speech Difficulty: Is their speech slurred, or are they having trouble speaking or understanding?
- Time to call 911: Stroke is an emergency. Immediately call for help and note the time the symptoms first appeared.

Other symptoms can include sudden confusion, trouble walking, or a severe headache.

Who Is at Risk?

Stroke risk factors fall into two categories:

Modifiable Risk Factors:

These are behaviours and conditions you can change to lower your risk. They include high blood pressure, smoking, diabetes, obesity, lack of exercise, and heart disease.

Non-Modifiable Risk

Factors: These factors cannot be changed, such as age, gender, family history, a previous stroke, and race. For instance, African American adults have a higher risk of stroke compared to white adults.

In fact, Black Americans are twice as likely to have a first-time stroke and are more likely to die from one. This disparity is often linked to a higher prevalence of risk factors like high blood pressure, diabetes, and sickle cell anemia.

The Road to Recovery

The effects of a stroke are unique to each individual. Physical challenges like difficulty walking or using hands and arms are common. However, the brain has an incredible capacity for recovery through plasticity and redundancy. With time, treatment, and a commitment to rehabilitation, many stroke survivors can regain lost skills and make significant progress.

A stroke is a serious medical event, but awareness and timely action are powerful tools. By understanding the risks and recognizing the signs, you can protect yourself and your loved ones.

Dr. Richard Konteh Refute the Proposition of SLPP Speaker of Parliament Hon. Segepoh Solomon Thomas to be Selfish and Flawed—Despite Its Surface Appeal

arlier in August (last month), the Honourable Speaker of Sierra Leone's Parliament, Mr. Segepoh Solomon Thomas, was on video in the wells of Parliament proposing a kind of power-sharing scheme that elections should not be a winner-take-all, but the winning party should share power with the opposition party.

At first glance, this proposal for power-sharing may seem like a pathway to peace, a quick fix to the deepening divisions in our politics. But beneath its surface lies a very dangerous precedent—one that threatens to reward dysfunction, undermine democracy, and stall the progress Sierra Leone so urgently needs.

Commenting on the widely shared video on social media, Dr. Richard Konteh said, "Let me be clear: Sierra Leone does not suffer from

a shortage of political positions to share—it suffers from a shortage of trust, fairness, and accountable leadership. The solution to our national crisis is not another layer of political accommodation, but a radical recommitment to democratic integrity and institutional reform."

"Our core problem is not the structure of government—it is the culture of governance," Dr. Konteh added. When elections are transparent, fair, and credible, the people's will speaks clearly. That is the bedrock of legitimate leadership. But when the electoral process is hijacked, manipulated, or discredited, no amount of seat-sharing can restore public confidence. Unity cannot be decreed through political handshakes in closed rooms. It must be earned through justice, trust, and respect for the people's voice.

Lessons from History: The Dangers of Power-Sharing as a Shortcut

We have seen where such power-sharing shortcuts lead. For example, in South Sudan, multiple power-sharing deals have been signed and broken. The cycle of violence continues because power was split without principle. Where there is no accountability, unity becomes an illusion.

Your proposed power-sharing, Mr. Hon. Speaker Thomas, is selfish and flawed. It will set a precedent where the pursuit of power by any means, even through violence or electoral rejection, can be rewarded with a seat at the table.

Why is this idea selfish and flawed?

The idea is a selfish move by those in power. In a country like Sierra Leone, where the political landscape is highly polarized, such a proposal could be a way for the ruling party to secure its position and limit the threat of a full loss of power. It could be interpreted as an attempt to protect the interests of the political elite rather than serving the interests of the nation. For a leader to suggest a change to the fundamental rules of the democratic game after the election results are known can appear to be an attempt to circumvent the democratic process itself. Instead of accepting the will of the people, the proposal seeks to create a new system that benefits the political class by guaranteeing them a seat at the table regardless of their electoral performance. This undermines the very concept of a free and fair election and can be perceived as an attempt to create a perpetual political class that is insulated from electoral consequences.

The proposal is flawed because it erodes the fundamental tenets of democracy. In a democratic system, elections serve a clear purpose: to determine who holds power based on the will of the majority of voters. A winnertake-all system, while not perfect, forces political parties to compete for the trust and votes of the populace. A power-sharing scheme, on the other hand, blurs this line of accountability. If the opposition is guaranteed a share of power regardless of the election outcome, it reduces the incentive for them to campaign effectively and for the public to vote strategically. It can lead to a sense of political apathy, as voters may feel their choices have less impact. Furthermore, this type of arrangement can create an unstable coalition government where the two parties are constantly at odds, leading to legislative gridlock and hindering effective governance.

Sierra Leone must not walk that path.

True Unity Is Built on Principles, Not Positions


What we need is not a formula for dividing power, but a framework for rebuilding trust across party lines, across regions, across generations. This is how we truly unify Sierra Leone:

- By strengthening our democratic institutions,
- By ensuring justice is blind and impartial,
- By making leadership accountable and transparent,
- And by honouring the will of the people, not suppressing or negotiating it behind closed doors.

We should not be negotiating how to split power—we should be negotiating how to restore faith in the vote, dignity in governance, and hope in our future.

That is the unity Sierra Leone deserves. And that is the vision I, Dr. Richard Konteh, am committed to advancing—not unity for the political elite, but unity for the people.

Let us be bold enough to confront the real problems. Let us be principled enough to reject convenient compromises that come at the cost of our democracy. And let us be faithful enough to believe that Sierra Leoneans, when given a fair and open choice, can chart a future defined not by division, but by shared purpose, shared progress, and shared peace.

A MAYOR IN ACTION

Makeni City Mayor, Abu Bakar Kamara Vows to Tackle Floods and Bad Roads

The Mayor of the city of Makeni, His Lordship Mayor Abu Bakar Kamara is taking a stand against the city's persistent problems of dilapidated roads and devastating floods. In an exclusive interview, the mayor acknowledged the deep frustration felt by residents and outlined a multi-pronged strategy to tackle these long-standing issues, from advocating for national support to confronting human factors that contribute to the problems.

Confronting the "Very Sad" State of Roads

Mayor Kamara didn't mince words when describing the city's road network. He called the condition of key thoroughfares, such as Makama Road, which leads to the Regional Hospital, "very sad." He explained that his office is in constant communication with national bodies, including the Sierra Leone Roads Authority (SLRA) and the Ministry of Works, to push for urgent repairs. The mayor noted that engineers have already surveyed the area, and he has personally engaged with the CEO of the Road Maintenance Fund Administration (RMFA).

While the RMFA is responsible for maintenance, Mayor Kamara emphasized that major arteries, such as OIC Road and Frontier Road, require more than just quick fixes. He pointed out that temporary repairs are futile due to constant flooding, which simply washes them away. He emphasized that the central government must take road infrastructure more seriously, as poor conditions are not just an inconvenience—they are a public safety hazard. Poor roads contribute to frequent accidents and hinder access to essential services, such as hospitals.

The mayor affirmed his administration's close collaboration with Bombali District Members of



Parliament (MPs), stating they share the responsibility of advocating for infrastructure development. He also revealed that he has personally raised the issue with President Julius Maada Bio and Vice President Mohamed Juldeh Jalloh, reminding them of past promises to complete road projects.

Tackling the Flooding Crisis:

The conversation shifted to the tragic issue of flooding, which recently claimed a young child's life. Mayor Kamara identified flood mitigation as a top priority. He highlighted ongoing efforts with partners like the National Commission for Social Action (NaCSA) to clean drainages and improve waste collection under the Makeni City Council's Waste Management program. However, the mayor pointed to a significant obstacle: human factors. He explained that some residents are building homes directly in the middle of canals and water passages. While the City Council has limited authority to stop this due to permissions granted by other government ministries, he appealed to the public to be more responsible. "It's a human factor that we need to solve together," he said.

Looking ahead, Mayor Kamara shared his long-term vision for a sustainable solution. He is in talks with the World Bank through the Resilience Urban Sierra Leone Project (RUSLP), which includes a major component on canalization. This project would provide a permanent fix for the city's drainage issues.

The mayor expressed optimism that these collaborative efforts would lead to a lasting solution for the city's residents.

LETTER 1

We Are Troubled By The Growing Economic Hardship

Your Excellency,

I am writing to you today not as a political analyst or an economist, but as a concerned citizen deeply troubled by the growing economic hardship that our fellow Sierra Leoneans face on a daily basis. While recent data from sources such as the World Bank and the IMF indicate some macroeconomic improvements, the reality on the ground for the ordinary person tells a different, more painful story.

The numbers are stark: a significant portion of our population is food insecure, and basic necessities have become a luxury. The value of our currency continues to be a source of constant worry, eroding the purchasing power of meagre salaries and daily wages. Your government has made efforts to stabilize the economy, and the reported decline in inflation from its peak is a step in the right direction. However, these improvements have yet to translate into meaningful relief for the majority of the population. The perception of a disconnect between national-level economic plans and the struggles of everyday life is a major source of frustration and anxiety.

We implore you, Your Excellency, to prioritize and accelerate the implementation of measures that will bring tangible relief. We ask for a greater focus on:

- Agricultural Support: Investing in our local farmers to reduce our dependence on costly food imports.
- *Salary and Wage Reform*: Ensuring that the incomes of public and private sector workers are adjusted to reflect the true cost of living.
- *Infrastructure Development:* Improving roads and transportation networks to lower the cost of moving goods and people.
- *Transparency and Accountability:* Tackling corruption, which siphons away resources that could be used to uplift our communities.

The people of Sierra Leone are resilient, but their resilience is being tested to its limits. This is a moment that calls for bold, decisive, and compassionate leadership. The time for promises is over; the time for action that can be felt in every household is now.

Stop Monopoly, Allow Free Market System

Dear Mr. President,

Let me first extend my greetings to you in the name of national unity.

Mr. President, a disturbing event unfolded on Saturday, August 23, 2025. News broke that the Sierra Leone Police halted the official launch of a proposed motorbike and "keke" assembly plant in Masiaka, an initiative spearheaded by Mohamed Omodu Kamara, a flagbearer aspirant for the All Peoples Congress. Reports indicate this is the second time such an interruption has occurred, the first being on August 16, reportedly due to a lack of clearance. Many people believe the police's actions were intended to protect an existing business, Shalema, an Indian company, from competition. If this is true, it is an injustice to our nation's youth and their families, who would have benefited from new employment opportunities. Protecting a monopoly at the expense of new investment is unpatriotic and detrimental to our country's economic growth.

In contrast, a free market economy thrives on competition. In this system, businesses compete openly, which drives companies to offer better products at lower prices to attract consumers. It encourages innovation, efficiency, and a wider variety of goods and services. Allowing this new assembly plant to operate would not only create jobs but also introduce healthy competition

into the market for motorbikes and kekes. This would likely result in more affordable prices and better products for consumers across the country.

Mr. President, you are known to be a listening leader, and I urge you to intervene and ensure the successful establishment of this assembly plant in Masiaka. A truly patriotic government fosters a free market system that empowers its citizens and creates a level playing field for all.

While I await your prompt action on this matter, I would also like to remind you not to overlook the request for the construction of the Makama Road.

An Urgent Appeal: Reconstruct the Matenhu Bridge

The photograph accompanying this letter vividly illustrates the severe disconnect between the neighboring Bombali and Karene Districts. This isn't just a story; it's the harsh reality for the residents of Karene, who face immense difficulties traveling to Makeni.

For nearly two years, the bridge connecting these two districts has been cut off, with no discernible action taken to remedy the situation.

The current predicament forces vehicles from Makeni and Kamakwei to stop on either side of the divide. Commuters are then compelled to pay for alternative means to cross, just to complete their journeys. Even those opting for motorbikes, while faster, incur additional costs, as both passengers and riders must pay to have themselves and their bikes ferried across.

This critical infrastructure failure has severely hampered business in Karene District, leading to stagnation and a sharp increase in the prices of goods available in the district headquarters.

Mr. President, the bridge in question marks the boundary between Kalangba and Gbendenbu towns, along the vital highway to Kamakwei. This situation is deeply disheartening for the very people who entrusted you with their votes in the 2023 general elections.



The Sierra Leone Road Authority (SLRA) has, in the public eye, demonstrated a lack of efficiency, effectiveness, proactivity, and fitness for purpose. Their attempt to use a coainer as a temporary bridge was widely condemned as a "death trap."

To rectify this dire situation, Mr. President, I urge you to revisit the Makeni-Kamakwei road contract. This review should explicitly include authorization for the immediate construction of a new bridge at Matenhu.

In closing, it is imperative to note that there are other critical bridges along the Makeni-Kamakwei highway, similar to Matenhu, that also require urgent attention. Failure to authorize the completion of this vital road network will inevitably lead to a complete and utter disconnect between these two essential districts.

Mr. President, the people of Karene are not strangers; they are citizens of Sierra Leone who deserve safe and reliable infrastructure. Please, act now.
