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THE CURRENT STATE OF WOMEN AND GIRLS EMPOWERMENT

IN SIERRA LEONE

Despite progress in various
sectors, deep-seated gender
stereotypes and structural
barriers continue to limit their
participation in politics,
business, and decision-making
processes. This article explores

the current multifaceted challenges facing women and girls in Sierra Leone.

Limited Participation in Key Spheres

Political Participation:

Women in Sierra Leone remain significantly underrepresented in politics. With only 15% of parliamentary seats held by women and even lower

representation at the local government level, systemic barriers persist.

Societal expectations often discourage women from pursuing political careers, and limited access to established political networks further compounds this issue.

Moreover, incidents of genderbased violence continue to deter

active participation, leaving women with fewer opportunities to influence policy and governance.

Economic Participation:

Economic opportunities for women are similarly constrained. Despite their potential, many Sierra Leonean women are confined to the informal sector or low-paying jobs due to limited access to quality education and employment opportunities. Gender-biased hiring practices and the persistent undervaluation of women's work restrict their economic independence, ultimately limiting their decision-making power both at home and in society.

Decision-Making Processes:

Women are often excluded from critical decision-making processes at the community and household levels. This marginalization hinders their ability to affect change in areas that directly impact their lives and perpetuates a cycle of disempowerment that undermines broader social and economic development.



The Impact of Deep-Seated Gender Stereotypes

In Sierra Leone, traditional gender roles and cultural norms continue to define and restrict the opportunities available to women and girls. Stereotypes that cast women primarily as caregivers and homemakers limit their access to education and career advancement. These entrenched views contribute to high dropout rates among girls, as many are expected to prioritize domestic duties and face the pressures of early marriage over formal education.

Furthermore, these stereotypes underpin a disturbing tolerance for gender-based violence.
Practices such as domestic abuse, female genital mutilation, and forced child marriage persist, violating women's rights and compromising their ability to live safely and freely.

Barriers to Education and Employment

Limited Access to Quality Education:

Educational disparities remain a significant barrier for women and girls in Sierra Leone.
Schools lack essential resources and qualified teachers in rural areas, resulting in limited educational opportunities. This gap curtails personal development and restricts future economic prospects, as education is a critical tool for

empowering individuals and lifting communities out of poverty.

Limited Employment Opportunities:

Women face a higher unemployment rate than men—17.5% compared to 15.2%—reflecting a substantial gender gap in the labour market. The scarcity of jobs and the mismatch between available skills and labour market demands further hinder women's economic participation. This, in turn, undermines their capacity to contribute to the nation's development and secure financial independence.

Lack of Financial Resources:

Access to financial capital remains a major challenge. Cultural norms and discriminatory practices often prevent women from obtaining loans, credit, and property ownership. This financial exclusion leaves many women economically vulnerable, limiting their ability to invest in education, healthcare, and entrepreneurial ventures. Poverty exacerbates their vulnerability to exploitation and perpetuates cycles of economic and social disadvantage.

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ECONOMIC JUSTICE FOR SIERRA LEONE

Why Sierra Leone Is Poor? Insights from "The Undercover Economist"

In our ongoing commitment to exploring the critical challenges and opportunities facing Sierra Leone's economy, The Unifier Magazine has launched the "Economic Justice for Sierra Leone" series. In our January 2025 edition, we set the stage by outlining the deep-seated issues contributing to economic disparity, and our February issue highlighted our unifying fight toward sustainable and inclusive development. This special March edition delves into "Why Sierra Leone Poor: Insights from The Undercover Economist."

Sierra Leone's persistent poverty is a complex issue with deep historical, institutional, and structural roots. Despite being endowed with abundant natural resources and a resilient, youthful population, the country continues to struggle with economic underdevelopment. This article examines the key factors that have contributed to Sierra Leone's prolonged poverty and offers insights into



what must change to create a more equitable and prosperous future.

Historical Legacies and Structural Constraints

The legacy of colonial rule has left an indelible mark on Sierra Leone's economic structure. Colonial policies were designed primarily to extract resources for the benefit of the colonizing power rather than to develop local economies. As a result, the nation's institutions were built around resource extraction, creating an

nomic model that has proven difficult to transform. Even decades after independence, many of these extractive structures persist, hindering diversification and leaving the economy overly dependent on a narrow range of commodities, such as diamonds and other minerals. This historical imbalance continues to impact government policies, perpetuating a cycle where short-term gains from resource exports overshadow the need for long-term development.

Weak Institutions and Governance Challenges

A critical factor in Sierra Leone's economic struggles is the weakness of its institutions. Corruption and mismanagement have long plagued public administration, leading to inefficient allocation of resources and undermining public trust. When institutions fail to deliver transparency and accountability, both local entrepreneurs and foreign investors lose confidence in the system, stalling progress. The lack of effective regulatory frameworks has allowed rentseeking and political patronage to flourish, diverting public funds from vital investments in infrastructure, education, and healthcare. Without strong, accountable institutions. sustainable development remains an elusive goal.

Market Inefficiencies and High Transaction Costs

Sierra Leone's economy is further hampered by persistent market inefficiencies. Poor infrastructure—characterized by inadequate transportation networks, unreliable electricity, and limited digital connectivity—drives up transaction costs and restricts the flow of goods and services. Small-scale producers,

who form the backbone of the economy, struggle to compete in an environment where high costs diminish profitability and inhibit growth. Additionally, a heavy reliance on imported goods, compounded by a depreciating national currency, inflates the prices of everyday commodities, making life increasingly difficult for ordinary citizens.

Inadequate Investment in Human Capital

The state of human capital in Sierra Leone is a critical factor in its ongoing poverty. Insufficient investment in education and healthcare leaves many citizens underprepared to participate in a modern economy. Overcrowded classrooms, a shortage of skilled teachers, and inadequate educational infrastructure limit the development of a competitive workforce. Poor health outcomes, exacerbated by under-resourced healthcare facilities, further reduce productivity and impede economic progress. When people are not equipped with the skills and well-being required to thrive, the cycle of poverty is perpetuated from generation to generation.

External Shocks and Global Pressures

Sierra Leone's vulnerability is magnified by its exposure to external economic shocks. Global commodity price fluctuations, adverse weather events, and the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have all taken their toll. As a small, open economy, Sierra Leone is particularly sensitive to changes in global markets.
