Sierra Leone is one of the poorest countries in the world, with a poverty rate of 59.2% in 2021, according to the United Nations Development Programme's (UNDP)Multidimensional Poverty Index 2023. This means that nearly six out of ten people in Sierra Leone live below the national poverty line.

Hunger and poverty are inextricably linked. Hunger is a major cause of poverty, and poverty is a major cause of hunger.

President Julius Maada Bio, president of Sierra Leone, recently announced his FEED SALONE programme at the 2023 World Food Day celebration. He called on Sierra Leoneans to join him in achieving food security and sovereignty as a priority for the next five years.

However, feeding a nation with unique socio-economic and geographical characteristics like Sierra Leone requires a comprehensive approach that balances agricultural productivity, food security, and sustainable practices. To help the president, the Unifier believes the following strategies can contribute to addressing Sierra Leone's food needs:

- 1. Investing in Agriculture:
 Sierra Leone's agricultural sector is central to its economy. Investing in modern farming techniques, irrigation systems, and sustainable land management practices can increase crop yields and improve food production.
- 2. Promoting Crop Diversity:
 Encouraging a diverse range of crops can help ensure food security and safeguard against crop failure.



Emphasizing indigenous crops and supporting farmers in cultivating a variety of nutritious foods can contribute to a balanced and sustainable diet for the population.

3. Improving Infrastructure:
Enhancing transportation
networks and storage facilities

losses and ensure food reaches

markets more easily, thereby
improving their livelihoods.



- 4. Educating Farmers: Providing training and education to farmers on modern agricultural practices, including efficient water usage, soil conservation, and pest management, can enhance productivity and sustainability.
- 5. Supporting Smallholder Farmers:
 Smallholder farmers play a
 critical role in the food system of
 Sierra Leone. Providing them
 with access to affordable credit,
 quality seeds, and technical
 assistance can significantly
 improve their production
 capacity and livelihoods.
- 6. Addressing Malnutrition:

 Tackling malnutrition requires comprehensive programs that promote nutrition education,

especially for women and children, and provide access to affordable and diverse food options. This can involve initiatives such as food fortification, nutrition supplementation, and community-based education on balanced diets.

7. Ensuring Policy Support:

Formulating and implementing policies that prioritize food security, land rights, and sustainable agriculture is crucial. These policies should be inclusive, transparent, and responsive to the needs of farmers and the overall population.

8. Conserving Natural Resources:

Protecting Sierra Leone's natural resources, including its forests and water bodies, is essential for maintaining a healthy and sustainable environment. Implementing sustainable practices that balance agricultural development with environmental conservation is key to long-term food security.

By adopting these strategies, Sierra Leone can enhance its food production, ensure food accessibility, and promote a healthy and sustainable food system for its population, thereby contributing to the overall wellbeing and development of the nation.



Harmony Behind the Hills: A Sierra Leonean Village Christmas Tale

This Christmas season, come to Rogbin village with me.
Drive past Makeni City. Make a left turn at Madina village (the late former Hon. Thaimu Bangura's village). Drive straight through the narrow, rough two-mile road, up and down the hill. As you descend the red hill, you will be greeted by the lush tropical greenery and the rhythmic lull of the African drums of this quaint village of Rogbin in Karene District on the foothills of Ro-thompraka.

In Rogbin, amidst the vibrant tapestry of village life, the spirit of Christmas always unfolds in a way that transcends the material trappings of the season, revealing its true essence – a celebration of love, compassion, and the indomitable spirit of the human heart.

I recollected as a young boy back in the 1980s when Sierra Leone was, as we used to say, "sweet." As the festive season approaches, the village transforms into a kaleidoscope of joyous preparations, a symphony of anticipation and excitement. The women weave intricate palm frond decorations, their hands moving with practiced grace, their faces aglow with the anticipation of the festivities to come.

The children scamper through the streets, their laughter echoing through the air, their eyes sparkling with the thrill of the impending holiday.

Amidst the flurry of preparations, which often starts on December 20th, he true essence of Christmas emerges, not in the abundance of gifts or the extravagance of celebrations, but in the simple acts of kindness and generosity that permeate the village. The spirit of humanity, the profound sense of interconnectedness that binds humanity together, finds its fullest expression in Rogbin village during this time of year.

The young men and women's social club, "Kaborre Kan Alangba," will organize nightly skits. On Christmas Eve, the village community center comes alive with vibrant sounds of thunder dancehall. The little boys and girls who don't have the money to pay the fare will creep through the palm leaf fence or jump over the makeshift wall just to get into the action.

As the night deepens, those who are not cut out for the disco dancehall will gather around crackling bonfires, whose warm glow casts dancing shadows on their faces. The rhythmic beat of tribal drums fills the air, their pulsating energy stirring the hearts of all present. In the fire's flickering light, the villagers exchange gifts, not lavish material possessions, but tokens of appreciation and love, handmade trinkets and heartfelt expressions of affection.

On Christmas Day, the village square comes alive with vibrant cultural and traditional performances- the Ojeh, the Rimbo, etc. The day ends with lavished feasts and communal gatherings where villagers share their meagre rations, ensuring that everyone, regardless of their means, partakes in the festivities. Amidst the laughter and

camaraderie, stories are exchanged, songs are sung, and the spirit of unity and togetherness reigns supreme.

In the eyes of the villagers, the true meaning of Christmas lies not in the acquisition of material possessions but in the richness of human connection, the warmth of shared experiences, and the unwavering spirit of hope that endures even in the face of hardship.


